## Tommys to Be Put in Windows for VE Day

#### What is VE Day?

- VE Day stands for Victory in Europe. On 8<sup>th</sup> May 1945, the Second World War ended in Europe.
- The Royal British Legion Industries (RBLI) have designed Tommys to raise money for veterans and their families.

#### On 8<sup>th</sup> May, the UK will celebrate the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of VE Day. This commemorates the end of the Second World War in Europe.

To mark the event, people are being encouraged to join in from their doorsteps. One of the ways they can do this is by placing a Tommy in their window.

The Royal British Legion Industries (RBLI), an armed forces charity, designed a silhouette and is asking people to display them. This is to remember the sacrifice soldiers made during the Second World War.

The Tommys are being made by injured veteran soldiers in a factory called Britain's Bravest Manufacturing. The business employs people that have been in the army, helping them to gain new skills once they left.

Steve Sherry, who is in charge of the RBLI, said VE Day is a chance to "remember our relatives who gave so much for us 75 years ago."

All the money raised from the Tommys will go to support veterans and their families.

A Tommy was a name for a British soldier. No one is sure where the name comes from; however, it is thought to refer to army slang for 'Tommy Atkins', which goes back at least as far as 1815. It became common in the First World War for people to refer to a British soldier as a Tommy.

On 8<sup>th</sup> May 1945, many people celebrated the end of the war in Europe. The Royal



Family waved at crowds from the balcony of Buckingham Palace.

This year, on 8<sup>th</sup> May, there are other planned celebrations. The Queen is set to address the nation at 9 p.m. This will be the exact time that her father, George VI, gave a speech on VE Day, 75 years ago.

There will also be a national singalong of 'We'll Meet Again'. This was a popular song performed by Dame Vera Lynn during the Second World War. Oliver Dowden, a minister, said that, although the celebrations will happen inside, he knows everyone "will come together to mark this historic occasion."
